As the congregation of Emmanuel prepares for the passing of the torch from one priest to another, Shelter Care is also anticipating change and the impacts it will have on the organization. This is a big year at Shelter Care as we continue to plan the direction and vision for the organization. Another significant leadership change will take place when Robert Parker prepares to retire in 2014 from the Jubilee Center after 22 years of faithful and dedicated service to members and staff. Change is coming, and we all feel it, which makes the partnership between Emmanuel Episcopal Church and Shelter Care so very significant.

As of September, board meetings will take place in Shelter Care's Seventh Street building, utilizing its new meeting room.

I pray for the grace of the Holy Spirit to send a priest with a strong heart for ministry, love of urban issues and a desire to grow and support the mission of Emmanuel and Shelter Care.

#### What's going on at Shelter Care?

The Bailey Project (our ministry in the Seventh Street neighborhood) is currently taking families into our beautifully renovated buildings. Rhonda, the project and property manager, has done a wonderful job of readying the units as well as working with our new partners, the Rockford and Winnebago County Housing Authority. Senator Steve Stadelman allocated a grant of \$30,000 to the project for capital renovations and—what is most exciting—in the neighborhoods where we have buildings, police calls have decreased!!

It has been a long summer (like a Tennessee Williams play). Of course it is always long when it comes to cash flow; yet it is August and we have made it through. Thank you to everyone who sent a donation to the Summer Appeal—you made a difference for all of us and we are grateful.

As fearful and full of anxieties as life can be sometimes, it is the support of friends that brings us through and as Julian of Norwich said, "all manner of things shall be well."



# From the Rector

Dear Friends,

Some months ago I saved a church newsletter article written by the Rev. Beth Wagner when she left First Presbyterian Church as the long-term interim. Beth did a wonderful job of writing about the responsibilities of the retiring or relocating pastor and of the congregation. I seem to have misplaced that article—I think it was just too close to home for me at the time. But it is important information, and I will do my best to share it here.

I have a responsibility to you when I leave Emmanuel—and that responsibility is to stay away. Although it may sound a bit harsh, there are many good reasons why priests who leave a congregation cannot return. I say "cannot" rather than "should not." It is understood in our diocese that clergy may not remain in the same parish after retirement. It is a matter of maintaining healthy boundaries.

That means that I cannot return to officiate on Sundays or for weddings or funerals. I cannot be part of your social gatherings. I cannot and will not ask questions of you about what is happening at Emmanuel nor will I express my opinions. I need to leave so that new relationships and loyalties can be formed between you and the priest you call. I need to leave so that you can grieve my absence or breathe a big sigh of relief, and then move on.

I need to leave so that I can grieve the fact that I am no longer your rector—a privilege I have treasured—and then begin to reshape my life.

And so, I ask you not to call me to officiate at any weddings or funerals. In the rare case that I would return, Bishop Lee's permission would be required.

An exception to my absence is related to my position with the Shelter Care Board of Directors. Bishop Lee has given me permission to remain as president of the board, being newly elected from the community at large. However, even in that situation, I will respect certain boundaries, holding board and executive committee meetings at the 7th Street housing offices.

My dear friends, this will be very hard because I have come to love the Emmanuel community very much. But I want the best for you, and this will help make that possible.

# Neighborhood Groups Meet to Discuss Violence Prevention

On Thursday, August 22 over sixty people from approximately six neighborhood groups gathered at Emmanuel to address the growing violence in our neighborhoods. The meeting was spurred by the recent shootings on Woodlawn Avenue, directly across the street from where one of our Shelter Care families resides. Also present were Rockford police officers, fire fighters and local city council representatives.

First, Sergeant Carla Redd from the Rockford Police Department dispelled rumors about the Woodlawn shooting, noting that it was not a random drive-by shooting, but was specifically directed at a resident for the alleged theft of a TV set.

During the course of the meeting, Sergeant Redd addressed concerns voiced by those attending and made recommendations about how to keep ourselves and our homes safe. People from the Churchill Grove neighborhood expressed concern about recent break-ins in that area. Sergeant Redd informed them

that all of the break-ins involved intruders crawling in through open, unsecured windows. The message here is to keep your windows closed, or, if partially open, incapable of being fully opened.

Remaining from the meeting are brochures and maps about our area along with lists of phone numbers to call when you want to report something in your neighborhood such as lights that are out or abandoned vehicles. You will find this printed material in the lower level (undercroft) on a table as you enter. Please help yourself.

The best advice: get to know your neighbors. Watch out for one another and share contact information. If you see something that doesn't look normal and causes you to be suspicious, report it. And call your neighbor. If an emergency, use 911. If something else, use the non-emergency number, (815) 987-5912.




